

Biographies

Claire Evans

Claire Evans graduated in 2006 with a BMus in singing from the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama where she studied with Margaret Aronson. While there she won the Hugh Roberton Scots' Song Competition in her third year and sang as a guest soloist for Carlisle's Choral Festival. Having sung in choirs from an early age, she joined the National Youth Choir of Scotland in 1997 and sang with NYCoS and its chamber choir until 2007. She performed numerous solos with them, including spirituals from Tippett's oratorio A Child of Our Time; Michael Torke's Book of Proverbs and Bernstein's Chichester Psalms. She also sang at 'BBC Proms in the Park Glasgow' which was televised live, and appeared on MTV with Christina Aguilera for its European Music Awards. In addition, she sang the soprano solo in Brahms' Ein Deutsches Requiem as well as Handel's Messiah – both in the Usher Hall, Edinburgh for 'Come and Sing Scotland'. Her appearances with NYCoS have taken in venues all over Scotland, as well as England and Ireland and two tours abroad. In 2006, she sang the soprano solo in the Serenade to Music by Vaughan Williams with the Royal Scottish National Orchestra, and appeared with NYCoS at the BBC Proms in London, with the BBC SSO. She has been a member of the RSNO Chorus for 10 years.

Claire currently teaches Kodály musicianship part-time in Glasgow primary schools and has delivered in-service training about this method to a number of primary school teachers.


Merchant Sinfonia

Formed in January 2008 by the BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra, with Glasgow Concert Halls as partner, Merchant Sinfonia is open to anyone over the age of 16, regardless of previous musical experience. It is an orchestra for all those musicians out there who think they're too rusty, too inexperienced, too busy or too nervous to play. It provides a great opportunity to polish musical skills, get back into music, or to have a go at playing in an orchestra for the first time. All players are welcome, from adult learners to advanced musicians, and those who haven't played for years. Led by cellist and conductor Louise Martin, the sessions are fun and focused, allow for players of all abilities to work together and everyone is mentored under the expert tuition of players from the BBC SSO.

Merchant Sinfonia's first concert took place on 7 December 2008, here at City Halls. It was conducted by guest conductor llan Volkov, the BBC SSO's then Chief Conductor. Tonight's performance is the Merchant Sinfonia's second concert.

The Merchant Sinfonia meets on a weekly basis and explores a variety of orchestral repertoire and arrangements in a relaxed, social environment. Louise Martin

After reading Music and English Literature at Sheffield University and following a year of volunteering on adult literacy and community projects, Louise Martin spent eight years teaching in the very active music department of a large Sheffield comprehensive school. Returning to Edinburgh, she was awarded a postgraduate MMus from the University of Edinburgh, specialising in Ethnomusicology. Subsidiary studies in Music in the Community led to placements in prisons with adults with special learning needs and people with disabilities, and for the Muzički Centar Pavarotti (Mostar) in Bosnia-Herzegovina and Croatia.

Louise now works as a freelance musician/animateur in a variety of contexts, including creative music residencies for the Highlands Council and East Lothian Council, sessions with Artlink, music workshops for corporate team-building events and with primary school children, and as musical director of Edinburgh's Stockbridge and New Town Community Orchestra. In November 2007 she led an open taster session run by the BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra for over one hundred adult amateur musicians and was subsequently engaged as conductor/animateur for the Merchant Sinfonia. She also teaches part-time at the University of Edinburgh and Napier University, and works part-time managing music education projects for the Scottish Chamber Orchestra.



Eric Dunlea

Born in Cork, Eric Dunlea studied music at the Municipal School of Music there and later at the University of Cork. Having completed postgraduate trumpet studies at the Royal Academy of Music in London he freelanced with the RTE Symphony Orchestra in Dublin. Eric moved to Belfast in 1978 as Principal Trumpet with the BBC Northern Ireland Orchestra and then to Glasgow in January 1979 to take up the post of sub-principal trumpet with the BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra, the post which he still holds.

In 1996 Eric formed a choir in his local village of Lochwinnoch and a few years later became Conductor of the Stirling City Choir. He studied conducting with Martyn Brabbins at the RSAMD where he continues to teach some of the finest young musicians in the country in the Junior Department. Eric also conducts the St. James Orchestra in Paisley, is a guest conductor with the Glasgow Orchestral Society and made his professional debut with members of the BBC SSO in Raploch Stirling, when he conducted a performance of Ibert's *Divertissement*. He was delighted to be appointed conductor of the Merchant Voices in October 2008.
